Life is the most precious gift we have from God, the author of life. All of us value our life very much. We all want to be happy and contended in life. Logically, as we grow older, we have to find ourselves happier and living a fuller life. Our joy and happiness must be ever on increase. Certainly, it should not be on the decrease. But in truth, the opposite is true for many of us. Many as they grow older. get stuck in the struggles that come their way of life. Suffering is often related to love and life. Love involves sacrifice, pain and suffering. A father who loves his family is ready to work hard and make many sacrifices for the sake of his family. He does not regard it as 'pain' or 'suffering' but an act of 'love' for his family indeed, it is his love for his family that gives meaning to his hard work and sacrifices. A mother who gets up a half a dozen times at night to nurse her baby does not call those actions 'suffering'. Hence, if we live in love we become loving persons. Many times we hear that Jesus' suffering and precious blood saved us once for all. How inaccurate; The fact is, it was the love of Jesus that had saved us and not his suffering and precious blood. Of course, because he loved us, he had to undergo the pain of being misunderstood and persecuted, shed blood and put to a brutal death. But it is purely His love that saves us. All of us are fruits of love, long for love and search for love. Hence Jesus would ask us to make love the rule and motive of our lives whereby we shall be happy always. Love is the passport to a state of abiding Joy, Peace and Freedom. The feast of Ascension tells sacrificial love never ends in failure but total freedom and salvation. As I reflect on the Ascension of Jesus, I feel that he ascended into heaven to lead us in love and celebrate the meaning of the freedom that sacrificial love offer. He is the leader of love. From heaven as the leader he has been giving an endless supply of workers to his church on earth. He wants all of us to be involved in the work of the Kingdom. That is why Jesus said to his disciples, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you and remember, I am with you always, to the end of age" (Matthew 28:19-20).

The mission of the apostles was simple to understand, but difficult to carry out. It was to teach others all that he had taught them through his words and actions. Just as he asked his disciples to obey him, they were to ask that others should obey his directions and instructions and live the life of love. The programme of redemption and salvation (The mission of love) must continue from generation to generation, person to person until the end of time. We had many changes in the church and in society and we still continue to change. For example, we experience lots of changes in our behaviours, our way of worship and social living now, due to Covid-19. But the two things that have not changed are Jesus himself, and every word of his message. The message and the messenger have never changed and will never change.

Pope Francis says: "I want the church to go out onto the streets, I want us to resist everything worldly, everything static, everything comfortable, everything to do with clericalism, everything that might make us closed in on ourselves. Our Parishes, schools and institutions are all made for going out if they do not, they become an NGO, and the church cannot be an NGO". He continues to say, "you are bearers of hope You are the protagonists of the future, artisans of the future Make the future with beauty, with goodness and truth.... have courage. Go forward. Make noise."

Dear friends, let us remember, we write a new page of the gospel each day, through the things that we do and the words we say. Therefore let us listen to Jesus words and make disciples of him. Disciples of Jesus through our examples. Disciples who obey everything that he has commanded us. And remember, he is with us always to the end of age.
