

16TH SUNDAY IN ORD TIME YR A

Today we hear how the Spirit of God dwells in all of us, helping us in our weakness. The first disciples had Jesus to explain the parables; we have the Spirit to enlighten us. It is the Spirit who helps us to interpret the teaching of Jesus and to be receptive to the challenges that they pose. There are two images of judgment in the readings. The one in the gospel is terrifying and decisive. The wicked are bound together into bundles and readied for burning. We must remember that this is a parable. In the first reading and in the psalm response the justice of God is said to be lenient, clement and kind. The power of God is demonstrated not in retribution but in mercy. God is said to be 'merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in kindness and fidelity', and repentance is a very real possibility. This is the image that gives us hone.

Father Jolly's Reflection for the 16th Sunday in ordinary time.

Our responsorial Psalm for today, totally describes God's attitude towards each of us. "O Lord. You are good and forgiving, full of love to all who call". God waits for our conversion to grant us his forgiveness.

Repentance, conversion, forgiveness and reconciliation are interconnected in the Bible. We find a total of 80 references to conversion in the New Testament. The main root used to express the idea of conversion is Metanoia which means to undergo a change of heart and the return to God. The Psalm continues to say to us that God is a God of mercy and compassion, slow to anger, and abounding in love and truth. God gives us time for conversion. Conversion means a total change from all previous non-life ways to ways of fullness of life. It means adopting entirely new life-giving attitudes. God waits for our call to be freed from our obsession with sin. In today's First Reading St. Paul reminds us that "The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness. For we do not know what, we should pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself pleads for us with unutterable groanings" (Romans 8:26). God is with us. Repentance and change of heart are our response to the joyful discovery of the Good News. It is a turning to God. It is the discovery of the unconditional love and forgiveness of God. When we discover this love, it becomes easy for us to turn away from sin. Every person is capable of responding to God's unconditional love and forgiveness. There are no hopeless cases with God. God searches for all of us. God has become incarnate to seek all of us in our loss. God's love is so great that His forgiveness is unbelievable. It is our common experience that through a true and real loving encounter with a loving person that we realize what it means to be a loving and compassionate person ourselves and how much we fall short in this regard. Encountering a loving person reveals to us who we are and awakens our inner goodness to be better persons. It stimulates us to be better and transformed persons. The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness in this discovery. We are all in need of repentance and of being forgiven. This becomes possible because God loves us unconditionally. The parable of the bad seed or the darnel show us there will always be evil around us, but God gives us the grace to remain among them and produce the harvest. It also tells us God continues to give chances and waits until the end to see our conversion. God is patient and calls us to be patient with evil. Secondly, we must pray that the evil forces of darkness may not overpower us. If we find it difficult to pray, let us call the Holy Spirit to help. "The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness". Our patience with evil should not make us passive or indifferent to evil. We need to do our bit to remove evil wherever we can. It is always better to light a candle rather than cursing the darkness. In Hinduism, spirituality is known as the human search for the absolute God in all human limitations, while in Christian spirituality God searches for humanity and saves it with all it's limitations and imperfections. But there is a beautiful prayer which the seekers of God prayed every day and is described as the perfect prayer in the Upanishad which all of us could pray all the time. "O Lord lead me from the unreal to the real, from darkness to light, from mortality to immortality or eternity". May we live for eternity and immortality with God. May we be able to join the Psalmist to sing the second part of today's Psalm for eternity. "All the nations shall come to adore you and glorify your name, O Lord: for you are great and do marvellous deeds, you who alone are God".

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE: Further to Richard McMahon's news in a previous report from the TWP, this week has been another busy week progressing the agenda to have a new **Pastoral Leader** in place for our parish by the end of this year. Last Thursday, we met with Peter Williams to begin the process of writing a **Position Description** for a person assuming this role in our parish. With considerable time spent drafting a document over the weekend, following the meeting and drawing on valuable help from Richard McMahon (Pastoral Planning Office), we now have a working PD document. Following expressions of interest by prospective applicants for the position, we can now walk them through what will be required in taking on this role.

As we engage with the diocese in discerning the best person for this position, we are very conscious of the fact that our Parish is committed to serving all of God's people in our local Community. There are 6,978 people living within the boundaries of our parish, comprised of Blackheath, Mount Victoria and the Megalong Valley. There are 1054 of these identifying as Catholic. Of these Catholics, an average of 100 (approximately 10%) currently attend services across our 3 Mass centres. We are all called through our Baptism to engage in spreading the Good News throughout our community. Supported and inspired by our **Pastoral Leader**, "As a community bonded together through faith, we are called to share our experience of God with those we meet each day, in particular, those in our local community." (Parish Mission Statement)
