# Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B 3 October 2021.

## FR. JOHN'S REFLECTION.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ

At first glance, the teaching of Jesus on marriage and divorce in today's Gospel text from Mark seems quite confronting.

"What God has united, man must not divide".

Catholic Marriage Law refuses to recognise divorce for those whom God has united.

But how do we determine who is or is not married "in God's eyes"?

Surely it is not simply a matter of form, of rules, of law, of process?

This text and its rather strict interpretation has been the cause of much anxiety and stress. It has hurt innumerable people over the centuries.

But, for me, there is a light shining in the gloom of such a traditional understanding....

I do believe that the key to this text is the next pericope in the Gospel of Mark.

Having been rather strict in his re-interpretation of Genesis, Jesus now forbids his Apostles from turning away the little ones.

Jesus can be seen as saying that those who are unable to live up to the ideal of marriage as expressed in the previous section should never be turned away by the community of believers.

"Let the little ones come to me"!

The unconditional love-ethic of Jesus of Nazareth must be at the heart of all that we do and say - both as individuals and as ecclesia (as Church).

Otherwise, we are at risk of descending to the legalistic approach to faith that was constantly criticised by the Lord!

My brothers and sisters, let us never close our minds to the life-giving Spirit of God who is alive and active in our community, our church.... that Spirit, that Paraclete, who will lead us into the complete Truth.

What was ...may no longer be!

God is a God of surprises.

And the omnipotence of the Divine can never be controlled by the finite minds of mere mortals!

Bishop Vincent has sent a pastoral letter (attached to the bulletin) which says that, in this Diocese, we will not be opening our churches until 80% are vaccinated.

In this way we will not be discriminating between parishioners.

I agree with this very Christian decision of our Bishop.

I have also attached a link from Catholic Outlook which encourages us ALL to be vaccinated for the wellbeing of our neighbour.

\*\*In marriage, the couple does not merely receive a sacrament, they become one. They become an outward sign of the love of God. They are able to open themselves to each other in love, because God has first loved them. When they become one in marriage, they create something new, something that is a sign of the



creative power of God. This in no way minimises the passionate love that they may have, or the unselfishness with which they give themselves to each other. Rather, it underscores the origin of that passion and the model of that unselfishness.

We are brothers and sisters of Christ in more than one way. First, through his incarnation, he became one of us, a little lower than the angels. He shared our human existence; he knew the highs and lows of human life. Then he redefined family relationships, claiming that blood bonds were no longer the determinant for establishing kinship. Instead, those who hear the word of God and keep it, those who commit themselves to God in faithful discipleship, are his brothers and sisters.

Marriage and other forms of discipleship make religious demands on us. Because we are taking a step into the unknown, they require a profound act of trust – trust in ourselves, trust in each other and, most importantly, trust in God. They also expect openness on our part – openness to give and openness to receive. Unfortunately we associate these characteristics with unpretentious children. While children may possess them because they are innocent, adults must repossess them because we have been recreated in Christ.

# First Reading

Gen 2:18-24

A reading from the book of Genesis

They were two in one flesh.

The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone. I will make him a helpmate.' So from the soil the Lord God fashioned all the wild beasts and all the birds of heaven. These he brought to the man to see what he would call them, each one was to bear the name the man would give it. The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of heaven and all the wild beasts. But no helpmate suitable for man was found for him. So the Lord God made the man fall into a deep sleep. And while he slept, he took one of his ribs and enclosed it in flesh. The Lord God built the rib he had taken from the man into a woman, and brought her to the man. The man exclaimed:

'This at last is bone from my bones, and flesh from my flesh!
This is to be called woman, for this was taken from man.'

This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife, and they become one body.

# **Second Reading**

Heb 2:9-11

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

He who sanctifies, and those who are sanctified have one origin.

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind. As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.

# **Gospel**

Mk 10:2-16

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark

What God has joined together, no one must divide.

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.
