Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C 31 July 2022.

Tied to and Tied by the Worldly Wealth.

In the Old Testament wealth is considered to be the blessing of God and poverty is looked down upon as curse and punishment by God. And even today people consider abundance as something very positive and poverty as a disgrace. Today's readings speak about the need of a life that is richer in the lord than the material wealth.

Today's gospel story starts with a brother complaining about another about not sharing the paternal property with him. And he asks Jesus to mediate his case with his brother. And taking the greed of the brother who was not willing to share the property with the sibling, Jesus presents the theme of true richness. He tells them that one's life does not consists of possessions. And life becomes richer when one is richer in those things that matters to God. And to explain this he presents the parable of the rich man.

'We the wise and the fool will leave their wealth to others when we die' says the psalmist (49/10). 'Money never made man happy, nor it will. The more one has the more he/she wants. Instead of filling a vacuum, it makes it even greater', says Benjamin Franklin. Still, we continue with our struggle to get richer and richer and at the end we go with the sense vacuum and never learns the right way.

And Jesus through the parable of the rich man asks the young man to have the right attitude and right living than having the greed for riches. And Jesus is inviting the listeners to opt for correct living with right attitudes than going after riches.

Through the first reading, we are invited to a simple living than going after vanity. It says that if according to vanity one starts living, there is no greater misfortune than his/her life; because all his/her days are filled with sorrow, grief, and restlessness. Even at night it is vanity that leads him/her.

In the second reading Paul in the letter to the Colossians invites the believers to put to death those parts that are earthly or worldly and put on new self which would help him or her become the image of the creator.

Wealth is good, in so far as it helps one to grow towards the ultimate goal that is to reach God. So instead of amassing riches endlessly, the right attitude will be to create and use the riches maximum for the benefit of maximum people which will become a helping tool for my final journey. And the understanding that "wealth consists not in having great possessions, but in having fewer wants" will help us to create right approach to wealth which will help us to utilise it in the way Jesus desires of it. May God bless us.



**Both the first reading and the psalm response speak about the transitoriness of life. Life is all we have and it is so fragile, so fleeting. When we realise this, we may fear that in the end we will have nothing to show for our lives. Such thoughts show that we have not learned the most basic lesson of life – life is to be lived!



The goods of the earth are both good and essential for survival and advancement. However, they do not satisfy the deepest longings of the human spirit. They provide us with pleasure and challenge, but they cannot shield us from the transitoriness of life itself. In the face of such impermanence, they are ultimately worthless. Life itself is the far greater good; goods only enhance life.

Recognising the transitoriness of life and the vanity of goods, we come to see that the only reality worthy of our total commitment is our relationship with God in Christ. Though made of dust and thus subject to perishability, we are joined with Christ and are promised imperishability. Having died to the vanities of this world, having taken off our old selves with their evil desires, we can now live as a new self, in generosity rather than greed, with openness to others rather than religious or gender or social biases. In our commitment to Christ we will discover that we can transform what is transitory in life by giving it away in love. If we can live in this way, life is anything but vanity!

First Reading

A reading from the book of Ecclesiastes (Eccl 1:2; 2:21-23)

Vanity of vanities, the Preacher says. Vanity of vanities. All is vanity!

For so it is that a man who has laboured wisely, skilfully and successfully must leave what is his own to someone who has not toiled for it at all. This, too, is vanity and great injustice; for what does he gain for all the toil and strain that he has undergone under the sun? What of all his laborious days, his cares of office, his restless nights? This, too, is vanity

RESPONSE

In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge.

Second Reading

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians (Col 3:1-5, 9-11)

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

That is why you must kill everything in you that belongs only to earthly life: fornication, impurity, guilty passion, evil desires and especially greed, which is the same thing as worshipping a false god; and never tell each other lies. You have stripped off your old behaviour with your old self, and you have put on a new self which will progress towards true knowledge the more it is renewed in the image of its creator; and in that image there is no room for distinction between Greek and Jew, between the circumcised or the uncircumcised, or between barbarian and Scythian, slave and free man. There is only Christ: he is everything and he is in everything.

Gospel.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (Lk 12:13-21)

A man in the crowd said to Jesus, 'Master, tell my brother to give me a share of our inheritance.' 'My friend,' he replied, 'who appointed me your judge, or the arbitrator of your claims?' Then he said to them, 'Watch, and be on your guard against avarice of any kind, for a man's life is not made secure by what he owns, even when he has more than he needs.'

Then he told them a parable: 'There was once a rich man who, having had a good harvest from his land, thought to himself, "What am I to do? I have not enough room to store my crops." Then he said, "This is what I will do; I will pull down my barns and build bigger ones, and store all my grain and my goods in them, and I will say to my soul: My soul, you have plenty of good things laid by for many years to come; take things easy, eat, drink, have a good time." But God said to him, "Fool! This very night the demand will be made for your soul; and this hoard of yours, whose will it be then?" So it is when a man stores up treasure for himself in place of making himself rich in the sight of God.'
