Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

The Gospel this Sunday deals with status and image.

We all want, and in fact need to be acknowledged and respected. This is normal and it is important.

We need this from our parents, our friends and the people we work with. But we need to work at understanding that respect and recognition must be based on actions and attitudes of genuine merit and value. It is in fact when we actively strive to respect and acknowledge others that we gain the right to respect and acknowledgement.

This is because, what drives us identifies us. The Pharisees were driven by their own self interests. We must be driven by the love of God and love of neighbour, this identifies us as Christians. Wanting ourselves to do the will of God and wanting the best for our neighbour. This turns us outwards.

Remember the old expression: "walk a mile in the other man's shoes"

Let's think about how we acted or talked with another. Let's think about how we think of another. Let's then turn this on ourselves and see how we would feel being treated or talked to, or thought of in that way.

That's a part of being present. Being aware of ourselves and what drives us. What emotions, attitudes and motivations are in us and seeing how we think of others, how we relate to them, how we treat them, if we respect them.

It's like all practices. Let's try doing it once a day during or after a conversation or some other interaction and see what's going on. Eventually let's do it more often.

If there is something that doesn't sit right, that we are a bit uncomfortable with, let's look at it and try not to go down the same path next time.

And for the ability to do these things we need help. To be inwardly focussed is natural to be outwardly focussed needs divine intervention. So, let's pray and contemplate, and when we pray let's talk to Christ and tell Him we need help to see what is in us, what drives us, that we need help to be honest with ourselves and we need help to change. Don't worry He is a gentle guide, and He will take us on a journey that is as easy as possible.

This will transform us. It will transform the way we think, the way we talk, the way we work, and it will bring life to us and to everyone we deal with.

It's this outward focus that is the servanthood Christ speaks of. Servanthood is not about status, it's not about being subservient, it's about actively trying to ensure the best for others. This active drive for the good of the other is the Glory of God. It's in this that we reflect the beauty of God into the world.

What greater honour or glory can a human hope to obtain than to actually manifest is some way the beauty of God. To be adorned by the beauty of God.

***Since Vatican II the responsibilities of leadership have been spread throughout the community. This has not happened simply because there are fewer priests and religious. It has occurred primarily because the Council itself insisted that



by virtue of their baptism all Christians are called to discipleship, which includes active participation in the mission of the church. While those who are ordained continue in specialised forms of leadership, other people have stepped forward to assume their newly recognised responsibilities. Sometimes they have more influence in the church than do the ordained.

We derive the connection between pharisaical and hypocritical from Jesus' description of the Pharisees found in today's reading. His condemnation, along with the condemnation of the priests in the first reading, should be a warning to all who in any way exercise leadership. We must always be on our guard lest the trappings of leadership ensnare us and we fail in our responsibilities toward God and the community we serve.

There is a mode of leadership that reflects the very meaning of authority. This way of leadership authors life. It is characterised by the striking image of a nursing mother who both gives and sustains life. Those who exercise leadership in this way create a community where life is fostered, not stifled, where talents serve all of the members, and the talents of all of the members are invited to serve. Such a community not only nurtures its members, it is itself the author of life in the world.

ENTRANCE

Forsake me not, O Lord, my God; be not far from me! Make haste and come to my help, O Lord, my strong salvation!

First Reading.

A reading from the prophet Malachi (Malachi 1:14 – 2:2. 8-10)

I am a great king, says the Lord of hosts, and my name is feared throughout the nations. And now, priests, this warning is for you. If you do not listen, if you do not find it in your heart to glorify my name, says the Lord of hosts, I will send the curse on you and curse your very blessing. You have strayed from the way; you have caused many to stumble by your teaching. You have destroyed the covenant of Levi, says the Lord of hosts. And so I in my turn have made you contemptible and vile in the eyes of the whole people in repayment for the way you have not kept to my paths but have shown partiality in your administration.

Have we not all one Father? Did not one God create us? Why, then, do we break faith with one another, profaning the covenant of our ancestors?

RESPONSE

In you, Lord, I have found my peace.

Second Reading.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians (1 Thessalonians 2:7-9. 13)

Like a mother feeding and looking after her own children, we felt so devoted and protective towards you, and had come to love you so much, that we were eager to hand over to you not only the Good News but our whole lives as well. Let me remind you, brothers and sisters, how hard we used to work, slaving night and day so as not to be a burden on any one of you while we were proclaiming God's Good News to you.

Another reason why we constantly thank God for you is that as soon as you heard the message that we brought you as God's message, you accepted it for what it really is, God's message and not some human thinking; and it is still a living power among you who believe it.

ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! You have one Father, your Father in heaven; you have one teacher: the Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel.

Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew (Matthew 23:1-12)

Addressing the people and his disciples Jesus said, 'The scribes and the Pharisees occupy the chair of Moses. You must therefore do what they tell you and listen to what they say; but do not be guided by what they do: since they do not practise what they preach. They tie up heavy burdens and lay them on men's shoulders, but will they lift a finger to move them? Not they! Everything they do is done to attract attention, like wearing broader phylacteries and longer tassels, like wanting to take the place of honour at banquets and the front seats in the synagogues, being greeted obsequiously in the market squares and having people call them Rabbi.

'You, however, must not allow yourselves to be called Rabbi, since you have only one Master, and you are all brothers and sisters. You must call no one on earth your father, since you have only one Father, and he is in heaven. Nor must you allow yourselves to be called teachers, for you have only one Teacher, the Christ. The greatest among you must be your servant. Those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.
