## Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Year B 4 February 2024

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

I think many, if not all of us, can sympathise with Job in the first reading. He complains that his life is just a drudgery. He feels he's gaining nothing from all his efforts just wishing the days and nights pass as he finds no happiness, either in his work nor in his rest. He's wishing his life away.

St Paul in the second reading writes about his preaching of the Gospel and explains that it's his responsibility to preach the Gospel, not a responsibility he chose but one that he has been given. A responsibility that makes him change himself so he can be effective (I made myself all things to all men in order to save).

In the Gospel we hear how Jesus cures St Peter's Mother-in-Law and many other people. The Gospel says Jesus cured people with all sorts of medical issues, and spiritual issues. This was how Jesus got the people's attention.

So, how do these readings come together to give us guidance for our lives?

I think the clue is in one thing Job says. He sees himself as "the workman with no thought but his wages". We need to see our work as having a higher purpose.

We need to see our work, whether at home or in the workplace as evangelisation, our way of preaching the Gospel. As St Francis says: "preach always and if absolutely necessary use words". It's not something we choose to do. It's our responsibility.

We need to live out our faith, our love for this world in the way we work for and with people. Our primary reward is not monetary but knowing that we have in some way advanced the good of the people we have worked for and with.

This means there will be a real difference in our attitude to work, no longer a drudgery but effort driven by a clear goal to do things to the best of our ability, to be extra fair to our employers, to treat our coworkers with dignity and respect so that we reveal Christ to them. Becoming role models for those around us. Role models who point to Christ.

In this we will be preaching the Gospel of Love, the Gospel of Christ and healing the world and driving out many demons. Demons of laziness, apathy, greed, self-interest and prejudice. We don't need to be doctors to heal. Just treating a person with respect, having time to listen to a person's problem, or being genuine in trying to help can change a person's day. Can help them see that they are valued.

But, as always, we can't just click our fingers and change our attitudes. We need Christ to heal us. Prayer and the sacraments are essential.

And the other big factor is fear. In our prayers let's examine what we are afraid of, put it before Christ and say to Him: "Jesus, I love you and surrender my life to you, please take care of everything". A very freeing prayer. It'll change our lives and the lives of others.

### Notice of Annual Parish Assembly (Annual General Meeting)



Suffering comes to everyone. It can take such a hold of us that the happiness of the past is swallowed up, the beauty of better days is forgotten,

### **ENTRANCE**

O come, let us worship God and bow low before the God who made us, for he is the Lord our God

### First Reading.

A reading from the book of Job (Job 7:1-4. 6-7) Job began to speak:

Is not one's life on earth nothing more than pressed service, One's time no better than hired drudgery? Like the slave, sighing for the shade,

or the workman with no thought but his wages, months of delusion I have assigned to me, nothing for my own but nights of grief.

Lying in bed I wonder, 'When will it be day?'

Risen I think, 'How slowly evening comes!'

Restlessly I fret till twilight falls.

Swifter than a weaver's shuttle my days have passed, and vanished, leaving no hope behind.

Remember that my life is but a breath,

and that my eyes will never again see joy.

**RESPONSE** Praise the Lord who heals the broken-hearted.

Second Reading.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 9:16-19. 22-23)

I do not boast of preaching the gospel, since it is a duty which has been laid on me; I should be punished if I did not preach it! If I had chosen this work myself, I might have been paid for it, but as I have not, it is a responsibility which has been put into my hands. Do you know what my reward is? It is this: in my preaching, to be able to offer the Good News free, and not insist on the rights which the gospel gives me.

So though I am not a slave of anyone I have made myself the slave of everyone so as to win as many as I could. For the weak I made myself weak. I made myself all things to all men in order to save some at any cost; and I still do this, for the sake of the gospel, to have a share in its blessings.

### **ACCLAMATION**

Alleluia, alleluia! He bore our sickness, and endured our suffering. Alleluia!

### Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (Mark 1:29-39)

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

### **COMMUNION**

Let them thank the Lord for his mercy, his wonders for the children of men, for he satisfies the thirsty soul, and the hungry he fills with good things.
