The Ascension of the Lord Year B Year B—12 May 2024

Dear friends in Christ

As we rejoice in today's celebration of the Lord's Ascension, we are reminded by the readings that we (the Body of Christ on earth, the Church) are now called upon to continue the mission that Jesus commenced in his short time on earth.

Since the Son is now seated next to the Father who begot Him, it is our responsibility to proclaim the Good News of Salvation to a world that desperately needs to hear it.

But we need to make sure that what we live and speak is faithful to the message of Christ, and not some new form of legalism or rubricism that undermines the proclamation of the New Commandment of unconditional love that we heard in last week's Gospel Reading.

It is always a danger for people of faith to fall back into a modern version of Pharisaism - as a 'system' sometimes helps us with the uncertainties of life.

Yet, as St Paul often reminds his church communities, we must move from 'milk' to 'meat'. We need to grow up in our faith, and live as adults - and that means grappling with the difficult decisions that a pastoral approach demands.

This is what Pope Francis has consistently tried to do: not change the essentials of Belief, but put a pastoral 'face' to these beliefs.

In the uncertainties of human existence, we cannot find God in the black and white... rather, God is found in the messiness, in the grey areas...

The disciples asked Jesus: 'are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?'

They still thought in simple terms. But Jesus disabuses them of this, and encourages them to move from cultural faith to a universalist approach, from simplistic ideas to something deeper.

And so must we!

Let's try to 'go forth and preach everywhere' as we have been commanded by the Lord. But let's make sure that we are preaching the New Commandment of unconditional love, and not something that restricts or condemns those we feel don't measure up!

A Happy Mother's Day to all mothers in our church communities! We give thanks to God for the one who brought us into this world; and even if they've gone before us, they continue to pray for us. Let's support our mothers in practical and prayerful ways on this, their special Day!

PARISH THINK TANK: PLANS RESPONDING TO DI-OCESAN SYNOD

As you know the Diocese held a Synod meeting Oct 2023. Since then resolutions approved by the Synod have been promulgated by the Bishop, and planning into how Synod Resolutions can be brought to fruition has commenced. The Bishop has invited us all to participate in this process. To this end, the Parish will host a local *Think Tank*, **Sunday**, **9 June**, **11:00-12:30pm** (after Blackheath Mass). The purpose of this important meeting will be to take up the Bishop's invitation, and gather our ideas about how Sacred Heart Parish (and the Diocese) might best fulfil the Synod Resolutions. All ideas, no matter how general or specific, will be fed into the Diocesan process and which will culminate in a Diocesan Plan later in the year.

***The Feast of the Ascension is really a kind of liminal moment in the Easter season. It is a time between times; a moment when we have left one place in our journey, but have not yet arrived at a second. While the narratives that describe the

Ascension fit well into the unfolding story of redemption, the feast itself celebrates one aspect of the resurrection itself, namely, the exaltation of Jesus. The readings help us through this paradox. They allow us to focus on this theological point while we commemorate a turning point in the life of the church. We do this by considering both the enthronement of Christ in the heavens and the new body of Christ on earth.

Today we stand awestruck, watching Jesus ascend into the clouds of heaven, there to be enthroned at God's right hand. Today we are overwhelmed by the divinity of the one whom we have known in his humanity. Amidst shouts of joy and exaltation, Christ is enthroned in heaven in both his divinity and his glorified humanity. Now he is present with us in a new way, in a new body, in the church. He teaches through its apostles and evangelists; he ministers through its prophets and pastors. Through us he continues to heal and to comfort; to forgive and to include. We have his power, the same power with which he performed marvels when he walked the earth. We have each other; together we make up the new body of Christ.



The Ascension of the Lord Year B

ENTRANCE

People of Galilee, why gaze in wonder at the heavens? This Jesus whom you saw ascending into heaven will return as you saw him go, alleluia.

First Reading.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles (Acts of the Apostles 1:1-11)

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is,' he had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you people from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

RESPONSE God mounts his throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord.

Second Reading.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians (Ephesians 4:1-7. 11-13)

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is father of all, over all, through all and within all.

Each one of us, however, has been given his own share of grace, given as Christ allotted it. The one who rose higher than all the heavens to fill all things is none other than the one who descended. And to some his gift was that they should be apostles; to some, prophets; to some, evangelists; to some, pastors and teachers; so that the saints together make a unity in the work of service, building up the body

of Christ. In this way we are all to come to unity in our faith and in our knowledge of the Son of God, until we become the perfect Human being, fully mature with the fullness of Christ himself.

ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!
Go and teach all people my gospel.
I am with you always, until the end of the world.
Alleluia!

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (Mark 16:15 -20)

Jesus showed himself to the Eleven and said to them, 'Go out to the whole world; proclaim the Good News to all creation. The one who believes and is baptised is saved; The one who does not believe will be condemned. These are the signs that will be associated with believers: in my name they will cast out devils; they will have the gift of tongues; they will pick up snakes in their hands, and be unharmed should they drink deadly poison; they will lay their hands on the sick, who will recover.'

And so the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven: there at the right hand of God he took his place, while they, going out, preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word by the signs that accompanied it.

COMMUNION

Behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age, alleluia.
