The 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B 13 October 2024

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

The man in today's Gospel felt that he had always observed the regulations of the Law of Moses. Indeed, he was a 'good person'. Jesus looked at him and loved him!

And, while it's important to be faithful to the external expectations of one's religion, Jesus points out that one thing is still lacking in his life: putting God in the centre of his existence, thereby allowing himself to be totally available to what God wants of him.

This is made explicit when Jesus challenges him about priorities: sell all you have and 'Come, follow me'.

We are meant to do all we can to live virtuous lives, but always with Jesus as the one in control.

By keeping all the rules, saying all the prayers, fulfilling all the expectations of faith... this does not guarantee us of eternal salvation.

God looks deeper than the external aspects of our life, to the hidden attachments that prevent Christ from truly being Lord of our life.

As the Letter to the Hebrews reminds us: "No created thing can hide from Him; everything is uncovered and open to the eyes of the one to whom we must give an account of ourselves."

And so, my friends, let's do all we can to place the Lord and his Gospel at the centre of all we do and say: for in this is the true way to salvation, to eternal life with God.

Calling on the grace of God, let's live virtuous lives to the best of our ability in the circumstances that life throws our way.

Indeed, let's listen to the Lord's call in the depths of our being, not allowing any attachments to make us deviate from walking in the footsteps of the Master.

And we remember the first Beatitude (our Verse before Gospel for today's Liturgy):

"Blessed the poor in spirit (= those who have God in the centre of their lives),

theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven".

A reading from the book of Wisdom (Wisdom 7:7-11)

I prayed, and understanding was given me;

I entreated, and the spirit of Wisdom came to me. I esteemed her more than sceptres and thrones; compared with her, I held riches as nothing. I reckoned no priceless stone to be her peer, for compared with her, all gold is a pinch of sand, and beside her silver ranks as mud. I loved her more than health or beauty, preferred her to the light, since her radiance never sleeps. In her company all good things came to me,

at her hands riches not to be numbered.

Second Reading .

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews (Hebrews 4:12-13)

The word of God is something alive and active: it cuts like any double-edged sword but more finely: it can slip through the place where the soul is divided from the spirit, or joints from the marrow; it can judge the secret emotions and thoughts. No created thing can hide from him; everything is uncovered and open to the eyes of the one to whom we must give account of ourselves.

ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! Happy the poor in spirit; the kingdom of heaven is theirs! Alleluia!

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (Mark 10:17-27)

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For people' he said 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'
