Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

This week's readings talk about hope based on trust.

The first reading gives us an insight into the theme of the readings when it says, "once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage"

So, when we read the letter to the Hebrews, and we replace the word "faith" with "trust" we get the truer message that the writer is trying to convey. This is because "faith" rather than meaning we believe that God exists implies that we have confidence in God, we trust in His promise with confidence that He will look after us.

This is the core of Christian Hope. As Pope Francis pointed out "Hoping, in fact, is not a mere act of optimism, like when we sometimes hope to pass an exam at university ("Let's hope we make it") or when we hope for good weather for the trip out of town on a Sunday in the spring ("Let's hope for good weather"). No, hoping is waiting for something that has already been given to us: salvation in God's eternal and infinite love."

It is this hope based on trust that calls us forth like Abraham to leave our own country and go to a foreign land, but it's not talking about a physical locality, it's talk about what St Augustine called the City of God. We no longer live as citizens of this world but rather as 'strangers and nomads', living in tents, temporary structures waiting for the City of God to be constructed.

This City of God is the Kingdom. This is what Christ is saying to us in the Gospel; "There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom."

Consequently, as we have Christian hope that God will give us the Kingdom we can live in a different way, focusing on doing good, helping those around us and learning how to live in this new state of existence in closeness with God. Detached from the anxieties and fears of this world and the pressures it imposes on us to be noticed and control our lives and situations and rather live in the freedom of God. Our hands and hearts set free to love God and neighbour without fear and concern for our security.

But it easier said than done so we need to work at it and not let ourselves drift off. Let's also remember something else St Augustine pointed out, that we need a Saviour, we can't do it ourselves, so we need to seek Christ. To seek Him and pursue Him and invite Him into our "house", but let's make sure there's room for Him in our "house".

- * Our Lady of Nativity, Lawson.

These Church Community Pastoral Teams will be responsible for local church activities, such as the following:

- * the celebration of the Liturgy in each church (with the guidance of the soon-to-be established new PARISH Liturgy Team)
- * the care and basic maintenance of the worshipping community's church, any other buildings and grounds (with the support of the soon-to-be established new PARISH Maintenance Team, a sub-committee of the PARISH Finance Committee (PFC))
- * the initial pastoral care and support of members of the worshipping community (with the support of the soon-to-be established new Parish Pastoral Care and Wellbeing Team)
- * the forwarding of local news and activities to be placed in the soon-to-be established new Bulletin for the whole Catholic Parish of the Upper Blue Mountains; this new bulletin will include a section for each Church Community's news, as well as news and events for the whole Parish, the Mountains Deanery and any Diocesan and other relevant and topical information.

I hope that this process will get underway next month.

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C

ENTRANCE Look to your covenant, O Lord, and forget not the life of your poor ones for ever. Arise, O God, and defend your cause, and forget not the cries of those who seek you.

First Reading.

A reading from the book of Wisdom (Wisdom 18:6-9) That night had been foretold to our ancestors, so that, once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage.

This was the expectation of your people, the saving of the virtuous and the ruin of their enemies; for by the same act with which you took vengeance on our foes

you made us glorious by calling us to you.

The devout children of worthy men and women offered sacrifice in secret and this divine pact they struck with one accord:

that the saints would share the same blessings and dangers alike; and forthwith they had begun to chant the hymns of

Second Reading.

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews (Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19)

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended.

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

All these died in faith, before receiving any of the things that had been promised, but they saw them in the far distance and welcomed them, recognising that they were only strangers and nomads on earth. People who use such terms about themselves make it quite plain that they are in search of their real homeland. They can hardly have meant the country they came from, since they had the opportunity to go back to it; but in fact they were longing for a better homeland, their heavenly homeland. That is why God is

not ashamed to be called their God, since he has founded the city for them.

It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead, and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead.

The Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (Luke 12:32 -48)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom.

'Sell your possessions and give alms. Get yourselves purses that do not wear out, treasure that will not fail you, in heaven where no thief can reach it and no moth destroy it. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like those waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Blessed those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but blessed those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

Peter said, 'Lord, do you mean this parable for us, or for everyone?' The Lord replied, 'What sort of steward, then, is faithful and wise enough for the master to place him over his household to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Blessed that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming", and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.

'The servant who knows what his master wants, but has not even started to carry out those wishes, will receive very many strokes of the lash. The one who did not know, but deserves to be beaten for what he has done, will receive fewer strokes. When people have had a great deal given them, a great deal will be demanded of them; when people have had a great deal given them on trust, even more will be expected of them'
